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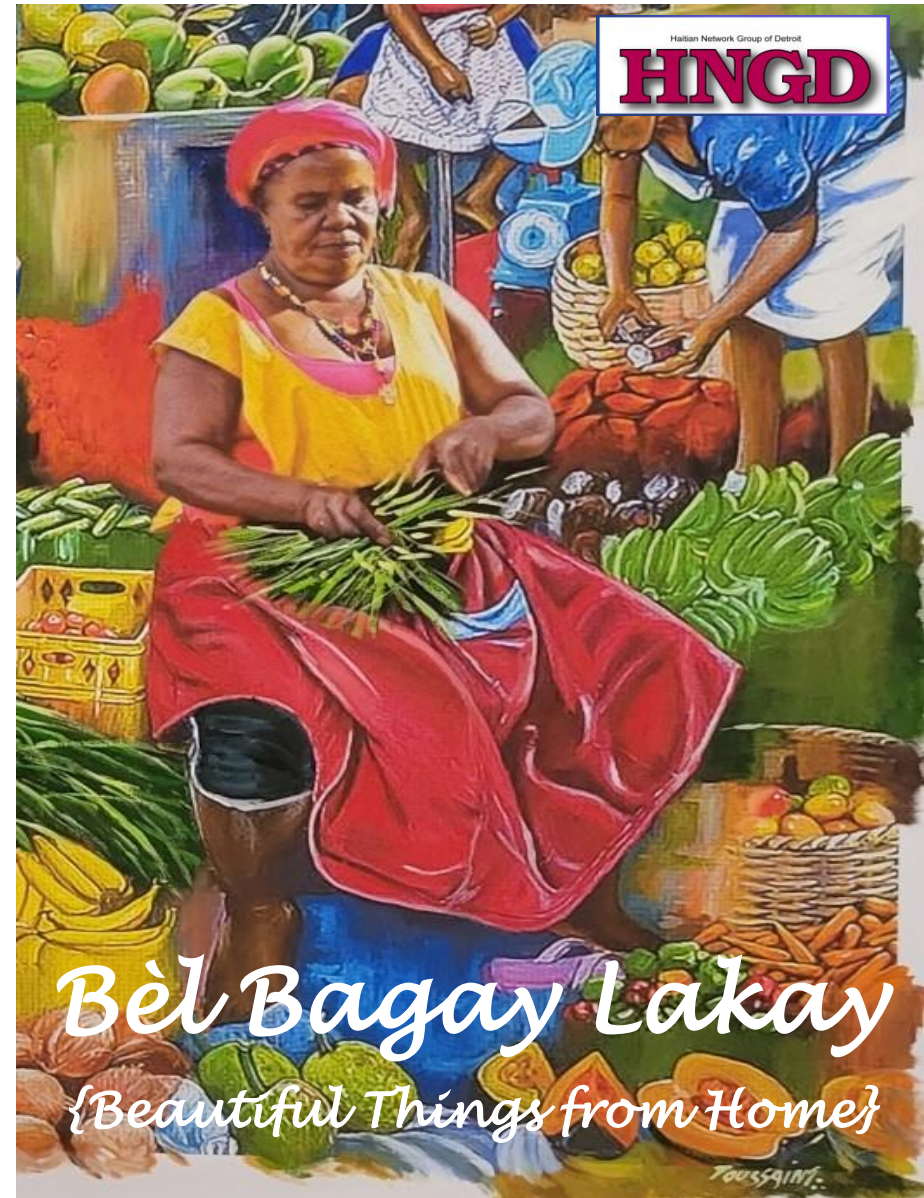

Since its inception, HNGD has supported a number of activities that have enriched Metro Detroit's multicultural tapestry. HNGD's numerous activities also extend into the philanthropic realm.

Most recently, in response to the devastation caused by an earthquake in the southern region of Haiti in August 2021, HNGD sprang and raised \$17,741 in a matter of months. HNGD has also joined the movement toward full recognition for Jean-Baptiste Pointe DuSable. Two hundred and forty years ago, this Black man who was originally from the city of Saint Marc (Haiti) founded and settled the area that is now known as Chicago. HNGD is currently managing a \$10,000 pledge in support of the construction of DuSable Park in the vicinity of Chicago's lakefront area.

Meet the Talented Artists & Artisans!

Following is a synopsis about some of the amazing artists and artisans who will be exhibiting at the fair.

We present you samples of their work; come view them in person and be amazed!



Ancestral Memory, Struggle, and Vision in Haitian Art

Anthropology studies humans in all time and all places. It focuses upon human action, thought, and behavior; that is what is termed “culture.” Art is culture. Haitian art is born out of culture. It is up to us to decode the message wrapped in the systems of signs of the artists. Beyond the western distinction of “primitive” in contrast with “formal” art, this art reveals a way of life. It is the most fundamental dimension of Haitian art. What is essential in culture is its transcendental character through space and time. It is human experience handed down from generation to generation.

The artist is a craftsman who considers aesthetic effect in addition to, or instead of, the uses of his product. In the case of Haiti, aesthetics is complex because of the various sources of the cultural heritage. Haitian art also teaches the social customs and traditions of the country. It is primarily the Haitian popular culture that inspires the majority of Haitian artists.

The work of art is always rooted in the land where the people live, but never ends there, and never comes completely from the earth. The work of art is both otherworldly and inner worldly. Haitian art has both dimensions. It is image and also represents an ideal, which lies in the horizon and remains never completely accessible, penetrable, nor factual.

Haitian art represents a totality. It projects on Haiti a great dignity and a great sense of worth. It “stands today like a remarkable monument among an impoverished people who are by no means poor in spirit...”

Roberson Zéphir

Roberson Zéphir was born in Pétiön Ville, a city located in the western side of Haiti. Having been born into a family of artisans, early on he acquired the skills necessary to seduce his fans with a style that is unique to him, regardless of the medium that he uses to channel his talent: painting, shoemaking, or sewing.

Roberson's work is a fusion of art from the Kasai region and Haiti that resulted from a stay in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. He also uses a special technique to transform leather, beads, exotic fabrics, and recyclable materials and enhances women's fashion by designing sandals, necklaces, purses, hats, and clothing items.

The **ArtisaNetwork** supports skilled artisans in various countries through preservation of local traditions, innovation techniques, and linkage to global markets.

They foster long-term relationships with international buyers and designers who collaborate with their artisan entrepreneurs to help educate the world about the importance of their craft traditions.

Their network includes over 3,000 artisans from communities in Haiti, India, Tunisia, Madagascar, Guatemala, Mexico, Cuba, Nepal, and France. Their team of experts offer a comprehensive range of experience in international business management, product sourcing/development, sales and marketing, and nonprofit project management.

Most of the work being presented at the 2022 Bèl Bagay Lakay Festival is from a group of artisans in Noailles, Croix des Bouquets (Haiti). The products are made from recycled oil drums and can be used for home decor as well as functional use. They will also include some accessories/jewelry/home gifts from various artisans in Port-au-Prince.

Samuel Augustin

Samuel "Sammo" Augustin has a Master of Fine Arts in painting and a Bachelor of Fine Arts and Drawing from Brooklyn College in New York City. He has taught painting and drawing for 20 years in New York City public schools. In addition to his experiences with students in grades 6 through 12, he developed special projects and built his studio and gallery.



The 20 years he spent working with students in the Artist-in-Education program were particularly formative. He worked with students all over the City of New York, not only teaching painting and drawing, but also developing large mural projects. In addition to teaching, he has been a studio artist for 28 years and shows regularly in New York, Connecticut, Detroit, and New Jersey.

His abstract paintings are an amazing mix of abstraction and allegories with a unique message. They have been exhibited in galleries nationally including in the main lobby of the United Nations building in New York. His best known mural piece is an allegorical work depicting Haiti's destruction after the 2010 earthquake, and rebirth as seen through the eyes of nine Haitian artists.



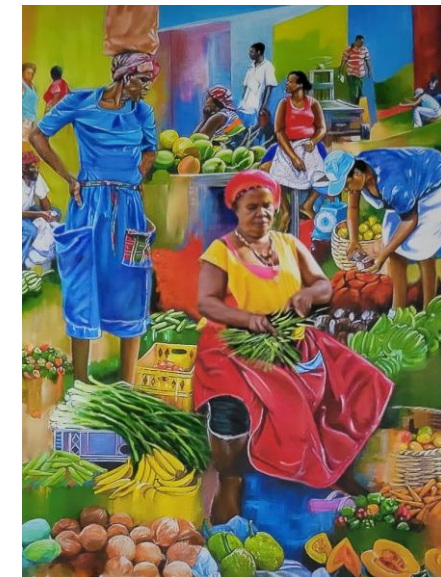

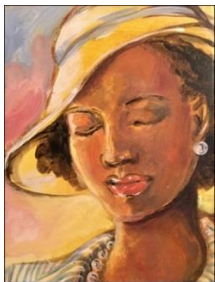

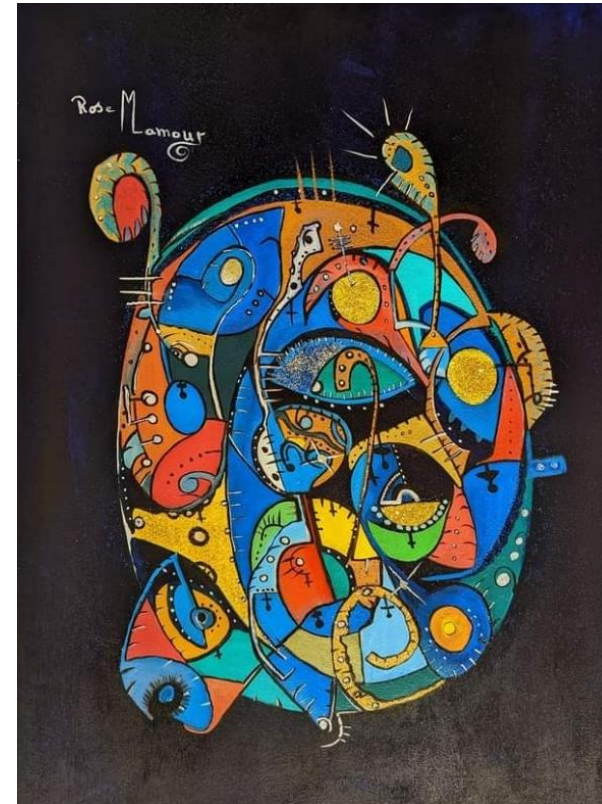

The Jacmel Arts Center

Mission: Serving as an inclusive space for the exhibition, education, production, and promotion of arts and culture in the Jacmel region.

Overview: The Jacmel Arts Center grew out of a collective movement of artists that had been working together under the name FOSAJ since 2003. These artists united together in an effort to reinvent themselves and breathe new life into the once-vibrant arts scene of the city known as Haiti's artistic capital. Operating in the historic Boucard & Co. building, which was severely damaged in the earthquake of 2010, the artists recommitted themselves to restoring the space as a formidable hub of Haitian artistic innovation. By repairing the wounds of the past and coalescing being a dynamic new vision for the future, the artists charted a new path towards rebuilding the active arts institution that it is today. It is now a space by artists, for artists, both visual and performing, to gather, inspire one another, and create together. They are using their craft and vision to reimagine the power of art to liberate Haiti's people.

Based in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, Atelier Calla has emerged from the imagination of entrepreneur Christelle C. Paul back in 2007. Though she had a full-time job at the time, her mind was set to make this dream a reality. Creating original collections bi-annually and participating in local shows sponsored by Vital Voices, she carved her way and made her name and reputation as a local designer and a reference for the horn and bone jewelry market in Haiti.



In 2011, after the devastating earthquake, it was all or nothing, and she opted for all and opened a full-time workshop on October 10, 2011. Atelier Calla production was immediately on the international market with Macy's *Heart of Haiti* Project and Urban Zen, growing ever since. Thanks to the support and training provided by institutions like the Artisan Business Network sponsored by the Kellogg Foundation, USAID program, Leve and Caribbean Export, our artisan group and director has had the opportunity to receive the tools to be relevant in the international market.

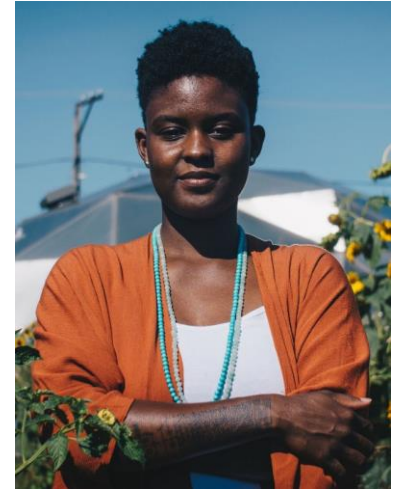

She received her Bachelor's in Fine Arts and Arts Education from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally.



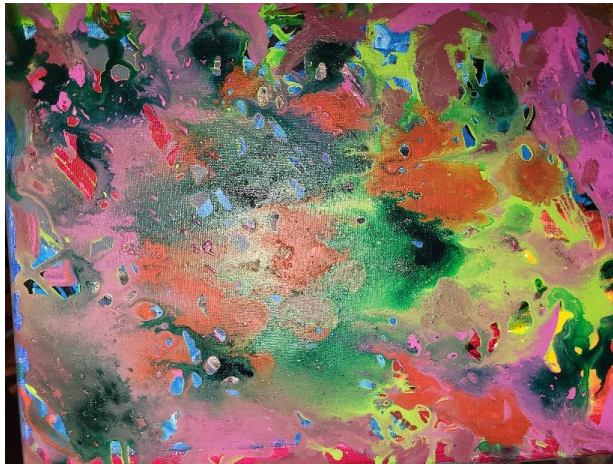

Carmina Mevs Laitmart Farm



Being featured at this year's festival is *C-Pique*, an all-natural hot sauce made of peppers grown at the Laitmart farm. Laitmart is a fruit and vegetable farm located 70 miles from Port-au-Prince in Marmont, Hinche, in the central area of Haiti.

Laitmart was founded and established in 2000 by Franz Mevs, and began operations in 2001. In 10 years, he produced more than 14 varieties of fruits and vegetables. Laitmart covers over 200 acres and employs modern farming techniques. Franz created an artificial lake to store rainwater and introduced the drip irrigation system to overcome the naturally dry climate of the region.

Laitmart supplies restaurants, hotels, the marketplaces of Port-au-Prince and its surrounding areas, thereby supporting the development of tourism in Haiti. Everything is 100% organic, free range, and GMO free, and the three main focuses of the farm are responsible farming, environment preservation, and community outreach. The farm's main goal has always been to develop the land and create profitability for the people of the region, as well as protecting the environment.



Jennifer Berkemeier Avek Ou

Jennifer Berkemeier is the Founder and President of Avek Ou ("with you" in Haitian Creole), a nonprofit that supports the FEJI youth transition home in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. The children at Avek Ou have been placed there because they have no other place to go, and are typically escaping homelessness, abusive situations, trafficking, and gang activity.

They are placed there by the IBESR / Haitian social services in collaboration with our local Haitian Directors. These children, ages 6-16, receive basic medical care, education, food/nutrition, security/safety, and life opportunities, with the ultimate goal of social reintegration (placing them within a stable, supportive, permanent family situation). Our home also offers art and education opportunities to children in the surrounding community, giving them access to learning and knowledge that they otherwise would not have.



"Imagine if everyone in the world had access to opportunity" is our favorite inspirational idea. Together, with our loyal donors and followers, we are building a community of hope and strength in Haiti, one child at a time.

My name is Carline Dugue and I am a first-year medical student at Wayne State University School of Medicine. In 2009, I first came to the United States to pursue my undergraduate degree in chemistry at Kalamazoo College. I graduated in 2013 and returned to Haiti to pioneer a peace project in the orphanage I was raised in.

Ever since I lost my father at a young age to a preventable disease and witnessed others from my community succumbing to similar illnesses, I have made myself a promise to become a doctor so I can help heal, educate, and train community members about such preventable conditions and how to stay healthy.

I also have a strong passion for learning about hair and skin-related conditions that affect black sisters and that has been the inspiration behind my new company Marabou International. The company's goals are to empower black women, support Haitian farmers, and encourage Haiti's prodiksyon nasyonal.
